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About Erasmus Student Network (ESN)

Erasmus Student Network (ESN) is the **biggest student association in Europe**. Present at **over 1000 Higher Education Institutions**, it unites over 500 local associations **in 39 countries**. More than 15,000 volunteers take care of international colleagues under the motto "**Students helping students**". ESN works for the creation of a more mobile and flexible education environment by supporting and developing the student exchange from different levels and providing an intercultural experience.

Causes of ESN

The Causes of ESN are a translation of our mission, vision, and values into our everyday activity. They represent the different fields in which we as ESN believe we can contribute to society through engagement with our International students. These fields are Culture, Education and Youth, Environmental Sustainability, Health and Well-being, Skills and Employability and, finally, Social Inclusion.

ESN for Social Inclusion

There are two main directions ESN is working towards in the field of social inclusion: widening participation and social integration. First, we aim to widen participation of students from disadvantaged backgrounds and students with disabilities through the promotion of mobility opportunities and accessible Higher Education possibilities. Moreover, we provide the conditions and opportunities for those students to actively participate in student life. Second,

with regards to social integration, our goal is to foster active citizenship through Erasmus+ student mobilities. To do so, we implement the **SocialErasmus programme**, which incorporates all Social Inclusion activities where international students engage with locals to contribute to their local host society; while the **ExchangeAbility programme** gathers all activities that tackle accessibility of education and student mobility, to increase the number of students with a disability that goes on mobility.

Impact

In the Fall semester, from September to January, the **Erasmus Student Network organised 808 activities**, where international exchange students had a chance to contribute to their host communities in ways such as food drives and donations, fundraisers, cleaning actions, kindergarten and school visits, educational workshops, conferences, and many more events that promote active citizenship and accessibility.

The high point of activity took place between the 19th of November and the 3rd of December, where everyone joined forces to organise 557 activities during the Social Inclusion Days, an initiative organised twice per year to stress the importance of learning experience of students during their volunteering activity and internationalisation at home for local students.

More than **12.145** International students joined as volunteers and engaged with more than **26.000** members of their local communities. All of this was coordinated by a team of **1.447** coordinators of the Erasmus Student Network.

Apart from the student focus, the main mission of the **Social Inclusion Days** is to provide young citizens with the opportunity to do more with their mobility experience, to make a difference and create a positive social change through volunteering.

Based on these results, we can also see that for each International student reached out to, roughly 2,20 locals. The effort of one ESN volunteer organising volunteer opportunities on average reaches 8,39 international students that will engage with 18,45 members of the local community.




This highlights the importance of the ESN volunteer's role as coordinator for such initiatives. The ESN volunteer is a key for International students to reach out to the local communities and to instigate connections. **Each ESN volunteer thus has a very big multiplier effect.**

Social Inclusion

Out of all the 808 volunteer initiatives, **521** had a **Social Inclusion focus**. The second most implemented cause is the Culture cause with 200 initiatives, closely followed by the Education and Youth cause. It's important to highlight that we also encounter cross - sectionality, as 239 activities that took place touched upon elements of more than 1 cause.

A good example is the Erasmus in Schools initiative where students touch upon various elements such as **culture**, **education** and **inclusion** hence this initiative answers to more than one objective set.



When analysing the breakdown within the Social Inclusion activities in ESN, we notice that 290 or more than half (56%), have a singular focus on Social Inclusion, closely followed by Social Inclusion and Culture with 13% of activities in this category, as well as Education & Youth, being a popular topic with 11%.

SocialErasmus, SocialErasmus+ and Erasmus in Schools

ESN is implementing the SocialErasmus since 2009. The **SocialErasmus programme** incorporates all volunteer activities where international students engage with locals to contribute to their local host society.

The SocialErasmus+ project¹ is an Erasmus+ Forward Looking Cooperation grant project to support the development and professionalisation of the SocialErasmus initiative.

The main aims of the project are:

- Better integrate the international exchange student in the local society by organising volunteer opportunities to ensure an exchange of values takes place between the International students and the local community.
- Developing and professionalise the implementation process of the activities by involving more stakeholders such as Higher Education Institutions and local schools in the process.
- Increasing the learning experience of students by engaging with Higher Education Institutions and Non-Formal Education experts to build in elements of Community Service Learning in the curricula and increase the recognition students receive for their volunteering activity.

Throughout the fall semester, 60,89% of the activities were activities that engaged with local communities and those 492 activities can, therefore, be classified as SocialErasmus initiatives.

In the activities that included both ESN coordinators, International Students and members of the local community, 3,59% of the participants were ESN coordinators, while 30,15% of the participants were International students engaging with locals, who make up the biggest group of participants, with more than 66,26% of the participants.

When looking at the Causes, or the interest fields ESN operates in, we can see that there is



not a big difference between all reported events all SocialErasmus events that reach out to local community. Overall the biggest focus in both cases is Social Inclusion, with 64,84% of all activities and 68,66% of SocialErasmus activities touching upon topics included in the inclusion cause. Education and Youth shows a clear increase with 22,52% of overall activities havina clear focus on education, within SocialErasmus this becomes a bigger topic as 29,07% of SocialErasmus topics can be linked to Education and Youth. We also notice a decrease when comparing the overall number of volunteer activities and SocialErasmus in the field of Skills


and Employability; as only in 0,62% of SocialErasmus activities tackle skills set and youth employability.



The SocialErasmus+ project has a focus on Erasmus in Schools activities, to ensure also local youth experience internationalisation and intercultural communication in classrooms from a younger age.

Throughout the fall of 2018, **89 activities** in Schools took place in **18 countries**, which is **17,01%** of all Social Inclusion activities.


All together 129 ESN coordinators organised Erasmus in Schools visits for 297 International students. Throughout these activities, more than 3189 local primary and high school students were reached.



We recorded the most preferred subjects during the Erasmus in Schools activities, as some subjects can strongly correlate when discussing certain topics, coordinators were allowed to indicate multiple subjects. The subject most present in the activities was the topic of Cultural heritage and cultural differences that was discussed in 51,19% of the activities, while

Intercultural dialogue is a close second with 46,43% of the activities discussing this. International Student Mobility, such as the Erasmus+ programme itself, was a close follow up with 36,90% of the sessions discussing international student mobility.

Recognition of skills (5,95%) and Equal rights (3,57%) were topics that were found hard discuss and were therefore reported rather infrequently.

When asking in which causes of ESN, our main interest fields in society, the Erasmus in Schools activities contributed mostly, coordinators answered that the biggest contribution of the Erasmus in Schools activities are connected to the improvement of overall

Education and Youth - field (88% believed so), while 42% of coordinators believed their initiatives contributed to Social Inclusion in society.

Accessibility of Education & Student Mobility

Out of all 521 Social Inclusion activities, 125 activities with a focus on accessibility of education and accessibility of student mobility were organised, out of which 100 activities were joined by students with a disability and in 98% of the cases the organisers managed to ensure the full accessibility of the event.

SocialErasmus+ Campaign

On the 14th of September, the Erasmus Student Network has <u>launched a petition</u> to European Commission and the European Parliament to create an Erasmus programme which encourages social integration & intercultural awareness through volunteering and engaging with local communities during an international exchange. The petition that currently has over 2,500 signatures is accompanied by the <u>SocialErasmus Charter</u> which examines the key elements that highlight the social dimension to an exchange programme and should form the backbone of an Erasmus experience.

Social Inclusion Days Initiative

Social Inclusion Days is an initiative where more than 500 local associations in 39 countries host events to bring together international students and local communities through volunteering and advocate for inclusive mobility programmes. This two-week initiative, running twice per year since 2017, provides opportunities for international students to expand their knowledge of their host countries cultures, and in having the



first-hand experience with the local population the focus is on the learning experience of the students during their volunteering activity and internationalisation at home for local students.



ESN International strongly believes in uniting our network around causes such as the Social Inclusion cause and instigate actions by our volunteers by organising training opportunities, workshops and seminars to give them an opportunity to share knowledge, cooperate and inform themselves about current important topics but also to get together and visualise the strength and impact of our organisation.

SocialErasmus+: Erasmus in Schools training

Together, Youth for Exchange and Understanding International and ESN are trying to improve and upscale the impact of volunteering activities of Erasmus students during their exchange. The training facilitated by trainers from YEU, focused on four aspects: how to best implement Erasmus in School activities, how to use the tools that are being developed in the SocialErasmus+ project, how to support international students in upscaling the content of Erasmus in Schools activities on topics such as cultural heritage; intercultural learning and tolerance for intercultural differences, and how to teach and inspire other ESN volunteers what you have learned on SocialErasmus+.

Social Inclusion Leaders Meeting

The training event gathered over 60 National and Local project coordinators of Erasmus Student Network. During five days (17th to 21th of October) they were sharing the knowledge, ideas, and inspiration in order to increase the social impact of the network and prepare for the year ahead.

Participants from all over Europe got to experience a variety of workshops related to the theme of Social Inclusion. Organised by <u>ESN en UV</u> with presentations and workshops delivered by the International Social Inclusion Team and ESN Eduk8 trainer, participants improved their skills, understanding of international projects and ESN's activity in the social inclusion cause. They learned to motivate Erasmus students to volunteer and to facilitate activities that promote social inclusion.

Inclusive Mobility Alliance

On the 27th and 28th of September 2018, more than 20 organisations with expertise in the fields of Youth mobility, Higher Education mobility and Disability have gathered in Brussels to start discussing and defining what it means to organise an Inclusive Mobility (aka a mobility that is fully inclusive and allows everybody to take part in it, regardless of their socio-economic background). During a meeting organised at the European Parliament on the 5th of December 2017 and hosted by MEP Damiano Zoffoli (S&D), the stakeholders present agreed to create an alliance of organisations working on the topic of Inclusive Mobility. The Alliance was officially created and launched in December 2018 with a long-lasting aim of monitoring EU and national policies as well as advocating for more inclusive mobility programmes.

During the Food Distribution, Mobility Students had the opportunity to help CASA (Centro de Apoio ao Sem-Abrigo = Homeless Support Centre) with their regular food distribution, joining their volunteers at the homeless meal centre and help distribute dinner to the homeless. In the end, the volunteers also help cleaning the dishes, trays and the meal centre. Sometimes a

homeless person may also need some new piece of clothing or shoes, so the participants also go to the warehouse of the organisation and choose an item that fits that purpose. The activity allows mobility students to meet the homeless reality in Coimbra and have a volunteering opportunity during their mobility.

Fika is an important concept in Swedish culture, where friends have coffee/tea & snacks together while having a conversation. Participants of the blind Fika were blindfolded while entering a dark room, and ESN volunteers helped them to sit down in a table with people they have not met before.. After some time some they were relocated to another table with other people. They have gone through a blind person's life by meeting new people they cannot see and walking without vision. After the experience, they ended the event with a discussion session where attendants shared how they felt, what they have learned throughout the event. According to the participants, there is a huge need for more similar activities, not only for the student but in general, in order to raise more awareness about the matter and include more people.
